

## Citing Sources using AMA Manual of Style

This handout is designed to provide a quick reference to using American Medical Association style for citing common information sources. The *AMA Manual of Style 10<sup>th</sup> Edition* is located at the Reference Desk in St. Paul and in Minneapolis at **REF R 119 .A533 2007**.

### Citing Print Sources

#### Books

<b>One author</b>	<b>Author last name Author's first initials. Title of Book. Place of publication: Publisher; year.</b> Bates WH. <i>The Bates Method for Better Eyesight Without Glasses</i> . New York: Henry Holt & Co; 1943.
<b>More than one author</b> (list all authors if six or less, otherwise list first three followed by "et al")	<b>Author(s) separated by commas. Title of Book. Place of publication: Publisher; year.</b> Goldberg L, Elliot DL. <i>Exercise for Prevention and Treatment of Illness</i> . Philadelphia, Pa: FA Davis Co; 1994.
<b>Edited book</b>	<b>Author(s), eds. Title of Book. Place of publication: Publisher; year.</b> Armitage JO, Antman KH, eds. <i>High Dose Cancer Therapy: Pharmacology, Hematopoietins, Stem Cells</i> . Baltimore, Md: Williams & Wilkins; 1995.
<b>Chapter or article from a book</b>	<b>Author(s) of article. Title of article. In: Editor's name, ed. Title of Book. Place of publication: Publisher; Year: Chapter or page number.</b> Gamble VN. On becoming a physician: a dream not deferred. In: White EC, ed. <i>The Black Women's Health Book: Speaking for Ourselves</i> . Seattle, Wash: Seal Press; 1990:52-64.

#### Articles in journals

AMA style requires the use of standard abbreviations for all references, when applicable. Abbreviations for many common medical journals can be found in the *AMA Manual of Style* (pp.473-479). Additional abbreviations can be searched in the PubMed Journal Database (<http://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/sites/entrez?db=journals>).

<b>One author</b> (do not include issue number or month unless volumes are not consecutively numbered)	<b>Author. Article title. Journal Title. Month Year; Volume:Inclusive page numbers.</b> Angelo J. A survey of persons who use integrated control devices. <i>Assist Technol</i> . 1998;10:77-83.
<b>More than one author</b> (list all authors if six or less, otherwise list first three followed by "et al")	<b>Author(s) of article. Article title. Journal Title. Year; Volume:Inclusive page numbers.</b> Wormser GP, Ramanathan R, Nowakowski J, et al. Duration of antibiotic therapy for early Lyme disease. <i>Ann Intern Med</i> . 2003;138:697-705.

## Citing Electronic Sources

### Articles in Online Journals

The preferred citation style for an electronic journal uses a DOI (digital object identifier). The DOI provides a persistent link to the electronic item and is considered to be more stable than a URL. When DOIs do not appear on the retrieved article or as part of the database citation, they can often be found using a DOI locator, like CrossRef DOI Lookup <http://www.crossref.org/guestquery/>.

<b>Article from online journals with DOI available.</b>  <i>Note that when using a DOI, no access date or URL are used.</i>	<b>Author. Title of article. Name of Journal. <b>Article from online journals without DOI available.</b>  <i>The accessed date will often be the only date available.</i>	<b>Author. Title of article. Name of Journal. Year;vol(issue);pages. URL. Published date. Updated date. Accessed date.</b> Hay, PJ. Understanding bulimia. <i>Aust Fam Physician.</i> 2007;36(9):708-712. <a href="http://www.racgp.org.au/afp/200709/18554">http://www.racgp.org.au/afp/200709/18554</a> . Accessed October 11, 2007.
<b>Web pages</b>	<b>Author or responsible body. Title of item cited. Name of website. URL. Published date. Updated date. Accessed date.</b> World Health Organization. Saving the future generation in Darfur. World Health Organization. <a href="http://www.who.int/features/2007/child_health/en/index.html">http://www.who.int/features/2007/child_health/en/index.html</a> . Published July 7, 2007. Accessed October 11, 2007.
<b>Other Media</b>  <i>Use for DVDs, videos, cd-roms, and other media formats.</i>	<b>Author. Title [format]. Publisher place: Publisher; Year.</b> Holzknect, J. <i>History of physical therapy in the United States</i> [DVD]. New York, NY: Insight Media; 2007.

### Citing sources within text

Cite references that are retrievable in text, tables, and figures in consecutive order using superscript Arabic numbers. Use commas to separate multiple citation numbers in text. Corresponding references should be listed in numeric order at the end of the document. Unpublished work and personal communications should be cited parenthetically. See pages 41-44 of the *AMA Manual of Style* for more information on in text citations.

#### Example:

...Of the respondents, 95% felt that discharge arrangements were adequately explained to them.<sup>4</sup>
